Pastoral Reflection: **This Article is Not For Everyone**

Christ is Risen! Christos Anesti! Al-Masiah Qam!

If this article does not apply to you, please stop reading when you realize it and skip to the next piece. Don't be offended; just move on. But if it does apply, please read to the end.

First, let me start with a bit of personal information: *I love giving you Holy Communion.* It is one of the happiest events in my priestly life. I love seeing you in the Communion line, because your presence there means that you share my love for God and for His Son Jesus Christ. I love to recite the formula for Communion and include your name. Speaking all those beautiful, holy Christian names is like telling the story of salvation. On a good day, we cover all the different saints from every era of Church history. It's just the mountain-top for me!

But lately ... well, lately I haven't seen you. And we've had some big events lately. Maybe you were out of town for Pascha. But I didn't see you the week before on Palm Sunday or the week after on the Sunday of Thomas. You didn't make it on Holy Saturday morning or on the Saturday of Lazarus.

Maybe your job requires you to be away from Church on Saturdays and Sundays. I certainly understand that. It's a tough economy now and every dollar counts. Even in the best of times, you have a demanding life, and I realize that Sundays are no longer the family days they once were. Many people have to work on the weekends, and you could be one of them.

But I didn't see you in the Wednesday evening Lenten liturgies either. These were really beautiful hours of worship. You should have been there. The choir has really come into its own for these services. We all received Communion together in our quiet, lovely sanctuary, lit up by the setting sun. people with morning jobs would be off work and able to attend and yet still get home in time for dinner at a decent hour.

Or ... if your job takes you away from an evening service, we had the Holy Thursday morning liturgy before the workday began; a number of your fellow parishioners came and received Communion and still made it to the office on time. It makes for an early morning for me on a long day in the middle of a long week. But I won't move that liturgy to a later hour, because I love giving you Holy Communion.

I know that your spiritual life is important to you, and that your church is an important part of your spiritual life, even when you can't always be here. I know also that once you fall out of a habit, it's not easy to get back into it. I know that there have been times when you could be here, and wanted to be here ... but maybe it just seemed like it had been so long, and one more week away wouldn't matter. And then that one week turned into one month, and one month turned into one year, without anyone meaning for it to happen that way.

As you read more deeply into this issue of the Lamplighter, you might get the message that your church needs you. But this is not the message I want you to take away. My message is this: you need your church ... *you need Jesus Christ!* And He is here—waiting for you—at the front of the Communion line.

Back in Holy Week we read the words of Christ to His followers before the Last Supper: "*With desire I have desired to eat this Passover with you ...*" (Luke 22:15). The translation doesn't match the intensity of the original. The Lord has a deep yearning to share this meal with us ... with you. And you need the food He offers.

I love giving you Holy Communion. But this isn't about me. It's about you. For your sake, come this Sunday and receive Communion. Come with your family and worship the One who gives you the gift of life in this world, and the hope of unending life in the world to come.

Truly the Lord is Risen!

Remember That Time ... ??

Sure you do. You remember. It was during that awful time when you thought everything was going to pieces. You prayed to God, and you promised Him that if He would just get you through this, somehow, you would recommit yourself to Him. I don't remember now if it was when you were sick ... or your spouse ... or was it something with one of the kids? Maybe it was that legal deal. Or was it the financial thing? Anyway, you remember.

No, wait! I'm thinking of that big thing you were hoping would work out. Don't tell me ... it was the job thing, right? Or was it about one of the kids getting into college ... or maybe getting that job they really wanted after graduation? Or was it about a promotion? Whatever—you promised God that if He made everything work out, you would definitely show your gratitude to Him. I remember you saying that. You remember, don't you?

Hold it! Silly me!! I am totally thinking of another friend of mine. This stuff didn't happen to you, good or bad. Your life has been relatively calm compared to other people. Hey, when you think about it, you should thank God that you never found yourself on your knees begging Him, promising Him, "If only ..."

Well, my memory isn't what it used to be. But my point is the same, regardless. Now would be a good time for you to follow through. God has been there for you, through good times and bad. Unless you're made of marble, you've been through a few things in life, and your faith was tested. And God passed the test for you. Maybe not the way you wanted, but in hindsight, it was the best way after all.

Can God count on you to hold up your end of the bargain? When His Church needs help, will you step forward and make the effort that you once promised? (Or should have promised?) Will you bring the thank-offering you once intended? (Or should have intended?)

All of us—if we choose to remember—can think of times when we didn't give back to God as we ought to. Now would be the right time!

And thanks for letting me jog your memory!

Treasurer's Report

The financial statement for March 2010 is included on another page in this issue of *The Lamplighter* and on the bulletin board in the parish. As shown on the statement, March did not end financially well for the parish.

In March 2010, stewardship and total revenues were \$4000 less than in March 2009. Disbursements in March this year were \$2000 greater than in March of last year. The bottom line shows a shortfall of (-\$6422) for March of the current year. Of equal importance is the total deficit for the first quarter of (-\$7722).

A conclusion that can be reached upon considering the first quarter of 2010, simply stated, is that the parish is hurting. Like many in the greater Lansing area, the parish is living "paycheck to paycheck." Although bills are being paid, the parish is not making great strides. A brief glance at a summary of the 1st three months of this year will clearly show what is meant by this onerous image:

The "paycheck" for the parish consists of the stewardship contributions that parishioners make. Stewardship constitutes 82% of the monies received. The remaining 18% come from several sources: fundraising events, candle stand receipts, profora contributions, Meijer Community Rewards, and the collection tray (beyond Stewardship pledges).

Stewardship receipts at the end of the first quarter is a little below the 25% level of what was budgeted for 2010; 25% represents the floor for the end of the first quarter. As we are all finding in our own homes, the cost of goods and services is higher than we have been accustomed to. Increased costs are one factor in this situation.

In last month's *Lamplighter*, the Parish Council showed what it costs to run the parish, those who attended the General Assembly in April were reminded of the cost: Fixed Expenses – those which are the same each month and to which we are obligated – total \$22,774. Every month the parish must pay or have in escrow this amount. This amount does NOT include supplies, snow removal or lawn maintenance, disposable items for the rest rooms, kitchen, offices, sanctuary, postage, bulletins, newsletters, or materials for the Sunday School or Choir.

If we add these latter items to the mix, according to what was budgeted, the amount required each becomes \$27,468! This may help put into perspective the above summary of the first quarter of 2010.

Stewardship pledges help the Parish Council plan and manage the financial status. As of April 15, only 165 pledges had been received for a total of \$187,000, which is equivalent to \$15,583 per month. In 2009 the parish had 253 stewards. As stated above, \$27,468 are needed each month for the parish to function and to carry out its ministries.

A pledge represents a commitment to the parish. The Council uses the pledged amounts in assessing the parish's financial status. A number of parishioners contribute regularly without submitting a pledge. Their contributions indeed help defray the costs, but without a pledge or commitment the Council is unable to consider intended gifts in projecting the parish's status.

Treasurer's Report, continued

Current pledges do not represent anything close to 100% of parish stewards; about 90 more parishioners have yet to submit a pledge. This large group includes regular attendees and donors. The parish needs to hear from these people and what they intend to give toward stewardship in 2010.

Against the backdrop of the dismal 1st quarter summary, what can each of us do to improve the situation for the rest of the year?

1. We can be sure to submit a stewardship pledge. Pledge forms are available from the parish office (482-7341).
2. We can make pledge donations on a regular basis during the year. Waiting until the end of year to take care of it creates seasonal cash-flow problems. Bills come in throughout the year.
3. We can make our pledge donations via an "Electronic Funds Transfer." Sign up for this automatic payment system by filling out the EFT form, available from the parish office.
4. We can each ask ourselves often – "Am I giving my fair share towards stewardship, towards assisting in the care and management of our place of worship and its ministries?"
