## Pastoral Reflection: **A Pastor's Reflection**

Back in 1939, Fr. Samuel Vlahousis was assigned to Holy Trinity as its first priest. He held the office of proistamenos until 1948, when the legendary Fr. John Sarantos assumed the role until the fall of 1956, whereupon he was reassigned to Lowell, MA. Fr. George Economou served the parish in 1957. Fr. Costas Kouklakis was the priest in Lansing from 1958 to 1962.

In 1962 Fr. John and Presvytera Poulos came to Lansing. It was Fr. John's first parish assignment, and he was the proistamenos until his retirement in 1992. Surely if it were not for illness, Fr. John's tenure would have continued for many more years. Fr. Gus Christo served the parish from 1992 to 1999 before he accepted a reassignment to Norfolk, VA. The parish was served by visiting priests for some fourteen months before our new hierarch, Bishop Nicholas of Detroit, found an even newer priest to come to Lansing. In July of 2000, Diakonissa Kathy Sietsema came to town to find a house while her husband was busy accompanying Archbishop Demetrios at the Clergy-Laity Congress in Philadelphia. Two months later, in September, my assignment as your priest formally began.

Earlier this year I surpassed Fr. Vlahousis and Fr. Sarantos in years of service to Holy Trinity. I am proud to be number two in terms of longevity behind Fr. Poulos. With the current clergy shortage in our Archdiocese, thirty-year tenures like his will probably not be seen again, due to the need to shuffle experienced priests to larger parishes. In fact, from what I am seeing, even ten-year tenures are rare in my generation of clergy.

A ten-year pastorate is something that speaks well of a parish. It says something about the quality of community life and the potential for ministry that is important to every clergyman. It says something about the maturity of a community that accepts a man for who he is, with his strengths and inevitable weaknesses, and thus gives him space to grow. It says something about the love of the laity who step forward to be like aunts and uncles, yiayias and pappous, godmothers and godfathers to the priest's children.

And so, on the occasion of my tenth anniversary as your priest, let me be the first to say to you, my beloved parishioners: Congratulations! And thank you!

Someone else celebrates a tenth anniversary at the same time. This is your Presvytera Katherine. She serves the parish zealously, as does every priest's wife. Some do it in more visible ways; she exercises her gifts in quiet ways too numerous to mention. I don't know how celibate priests manage their work without a presvytera as their partner. Each and every one of you has all been blessed by her service, though perhaps in ways that you are not aware of. Congratulations, Presvytera mou! *Kai eis Anoter!*

# A Vision for the Future: 4th Installment

## *A Recap and the Next Step.*

The June, July and August issues of The Lamplighter informed the community of an important project for the future of Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church of Lansing. That project involves a capital campaign to raise funds to allow Holy Trinity to develop important ministry programs, stabilize the financial status, and to maintain and update our facilities.

A capital campaign is an important step in the history of Holy Trinity. It helps move the parish from operating on a year-to-year budget to planning and functioning over multi-year periods. Also, a campaign can empower the community to think of the parish in more long-range terms both spiritually and financially.

1. The June issue published a needs statement “A Vision for the Future: Statement of Need 2010-2015.” In this statement the Parish Council explains the critical steps we must take as a parish to secure our future. The steps include a capital campaign to raise funds that will allow Holy Trinity to develop important ministry programs, stabilize our financial status, and to maintain and update our facilities.

2. The July issue published several “Frequently Asked Questions” about capital campaigns to inform the community further about this important undertaking in such specific terms as: the role of parishioners, relationship of stewardship pledges and campaign pledges, benefits to the parish ministries, programs development, and facilities improvement.

3. The August issue published a continuation of “Frequently Asked Questions” focusing on the specific areas targeted for a campaign: Ministries – Education, Youth, and “Reach Out” Fiscal Stability – reduction and removal of the parish’s debt burden and redirection of the funds currently used each month as loan payments Capital improvements – removal and replacement of the parking lot, upgrade of classrooms and education wing, completion of processional walk, upgrade/rebuild AC and heating systems, replace Lobby window glass with insulated, double-pane glass, sanctuary

lighting system, replacement of ceiling tiles in the Narthex, enhancement of the sanctuary sound system, replacement of kitchen ovens, make acoustical adjustments to the Social Hall, replace the wall of many colors between the Lobby and Narthex.

## *The next step: Inauguration of a campaign - September.*

As part of the Campaign, a Planning Study will be conducted early this autumn to help determine the parish’s readiness to undertake such a project.

The Office of Parish Development of our Archdiocese will assist us with this effort. Mr. Jerry Minetos, Director of that Office, and his colleague, Ms. Laura Paulus will be at Holy Trinity for a couple of weeks at the end of September to facilitate several activities. They will lead focus group and individual discussions with parishioners. Parishioners will be interviewed and all will be asked to complete questionnaires that will be useful in assessing parishioner interest in and support of the project. Their findings will be then compiled in a study for the parish.

Parishioners are the key to success for a project of this order. Feedback and input from all parishioners will be requested in several ways – input can be provided in person through interviews with Mr. Minetos or Ms. Paulus, through an online or mailed survey, or by participating in public discussion in focus groups.

teachings, and to love you.

When you baptize one another's children, the oil of anointing coats your hands and forms new family bonds; this same oil coats the priest's hands as well. With each baptism and wedding, he is there with your family in the happiest times. He also is called into your places of deepest sorrow: hospital wards and funeral parlors and also times of conflict. In the snapshots of your family memories over the years, the priest is like Forrest Gump: you can always spot him in some corner of the picture.

And so I add this observation from ten years of priestly service: "Life is like a box of chocolates."

Why? Because if you pay attention to what comes with the package, you get a pretty good idea of the choices you should make. Fine chocolates will have a little map in the box, maybe even some pictures. If you can't find some indication of what it is you're going to eat, you shouldn't bother with the whole box.

The God who made us all and nurtures our lives, this God has not left us without instruction to help inform our choices in life. We have but to pay attention to this aid, and we can have a better handle on life's inevitable ups and downs. But wisdom comes to us ever so slowly—as Aeschylus poignantly phrased it—drop by drop, through the grace of God. It is for this reason that I remind you so often of the importance of regular church attendance. Where else in the modern world can you find expressions of reverence, purity, wonder, joy, and humility combined? These experiences feed your soul and guide you to better choices as you sort through the box of chocolates that is life. There is nothing else that you can do on a Sunday morning that surpasses worship in importance.

I never stop being impressed at how well our Orthodox worship, and especially the Divine Liturgy, anticipates every spiritual need. We have but to heed the call to *be attentive*. It is for this reason that I try to keep my liturgical duties always at the top of my priorities. Every parish priest has the role of chief cook and bottle-washer, and it would be easy to let more visible activities take first place. Such efforts would be applauded by some; but my job is to feed souls, not egos.

The parish has made significant progress over the past ten years, especially in terms of caring for our church building. These truly commendable accomplishments are yours, not

mine. My role in those achievements has been largely to bless you, to encourage you, and to remind you occasionally that you are capable of higher standards. But the real work, and the real credit, are yours.

For my part, I will claim only this: I have baptized your children with love; I have married your young people with joy; I have buried your loved ones with all Christian dignity; and, to the best of my ability, I have taught you the Word of Truth, in season and out of season. This has been my privilege over these ten years, and I am grateful to God for all of them and for all of you. May He answer every prayer we have offered together for your lives, your families, and your salvation. Amen!

# Treasurer's Report

The following report is based on the financial sheet dated July 31, 2010, which is published elsewhere in this issue of The Lamplighter.

1. July 31 represents the completion of 7/12 or 58.3% of the current fiscal year.
2. Revenues:
  - a. Stewardship received = 58.7% of the budgeted amount
  - b. Total Revenues = 58.7%
  - c. 2009 - Total Revenues, July 2009 = 59.8% of the budgeted amount
3. Disbursements:
  - a. Total Disbursements = 57.9% of the projected expenses for the year
  - b. 2009 – Total Revenues, July 2009 = 61.3% of the budgeted amount
4. Net Results:
  - a. July 2010 resulted in a negative -\$10986
  - b. Y-T-D, July 2010, shows a positive \$2610
  - c. 2009 – Net for July 2009 = negative -\$6347
  - d. Y-T-D, July 2009 = negative -\$6641

The above summary presents only one perspective on the financial situation at the close of July 2010. It shows that the parish is generally on track during the current fiscal year.

However, in April, May and June of this year, the parish had a positive bottom line each month. The positive results of these months were eroded by the reduction in revenue -- specifically stewardship offerings, in July and resulted in a negative figure. The annual budget relies on projected average weekly revenue of \$6300; in July, the weekly receipts averaged \$4100.

Annually receipts during the summer are lower than in other months. If the pattern of previous years holds true in the current year, the average weekly offerings will increase once the Holy Trinity family returns home following the summer break.

An easy solution to the annual reduction in weekly offering during the summer is available for the asking: direct bank deposit or electronic transfer of stewardship gifts. As announced previously, this service is available to Holy Trinity parishioners. For detailed information on direct deposit of stewardship offerings, contact the parish office at 482-7341, 9:00 – 1:00 Monday through Friday.

## From Our Archdiocese

The Rebuilding of St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Christian Church

NEW YORK - As is well known, on September 11, 2001 our city and nation suffered a terrorist attack of unparalleled proportions. In addition to the tragic and horrific loss of almost 3,000 innocent victims, a number of whom were members of our own community, the world witnessed the unimaginable collapse of the Twin Towers. When the second Tower fell, it landed on and erased all traces of the Greek Orthodox Christian Church of St. Nicholas, the only house of worship destroyed that day. Opened in 1916 by a group of Greek immigrants, the church not only served the spiritual needs of its parishioners but was also a sacred space in which people of all ethnic and religious backgrounds working in the surrounding area would often stop, light a candle and spend a few moments in prayer and reflection.

Following the events of 9/11, the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America and the St. Nicholas parish fully cooperated and worked closely with the relevant authorities. Former Governor George Pataki pledged without reservation his support for rebuilding in the belief that it was a necessary part of the healing of New York City and of our nation. Early on, as plans were being formulated for the reconstruction of the area, the Church agreed to relocate and rebuild its house of worship at a new locale to facilitate the envisioned design for the overall site. In 2004, the authorities proposed that the new edifice be built at 130 Liberty Street, a parcel on the same block as the original site, and an agreement was reached between the Archdiocese and the Port Authority. Four successive LMDC/Port Authority administrations honored this mutual agreement which entailed extensive on-going work and planning on the part of all parties. All site plans for the area which the LMDC/Port Authority released to the public show St. Nicholas at this new locale. Regrettably, the latest Port Authority administration in 2009 unexpectedly and arbi-

trarily reneged on this agreement and as a result, the Archdiocese and St. Nicholas parish are suddenly offered no viable option. LMDC/Port Authority has refused to meet with us. In the meantime the LMDC/Port Authority has excavated the original site without our consent, rendering it unusable, in flagrant violation of our legal rights.

The Archdiocese and parish leadership remain firmly committed to the rebuilding of the church honoring the long standing agreement with LMDC/Port Authority. Confident that we have acted in good faith and trusting in Almighty God, we expect that justice will prevail and that we will be successful in this sacred endeavor.

## The Friends of the Metropolis

Our Bishop needs our help! The Metropolis of Detroit offers ministries and programs that exceed anything that a parish would be able to do on its own. These services strengthen our faith and bring us together as a Christian family from across the miles.

But the Metropolis, like the parish, needs financial support in order to thrive. The "Friends of the Metropolis" program raises funds for diocesan operations, based solely on free-will pledges of individual parishioners. If every family in the Metropolis gave but \$50 a year, our Metropolis would soar on the wings of eagles!

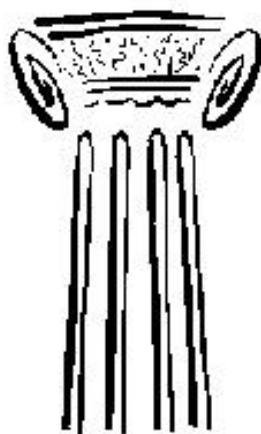
